☆☆ (A) The Wave Hill Station Strike

Until the late 1960s, many Australian Aboriginal people whose land had been forcibly taken from them by White landowners were employed on cattle-grazing lands called stations. Wave Hill Station was one of many stations that exploited these Aboriginal workers. Wages were extremely low, water and sanitation were lacking, and local Aboriginal people were the victims of routine violence at the hands of White landowners. In 1966, an elder of the Gurindji people, whose traditional land included Wave Hill Station, led the workers on a strike. About 200 Aboriginal employees and their families walked off the station. Though the strike was seen by many people as being about workers' pay and living conditions, for the Gurindji people, the primary focus was reclaiming their land.

The strike went on for a number of years until the Australian political situation changed with the election of the Labor Party. One of its policies was resolving the issue of Aboriginal land rights. In the mid-1970s, the Gurindji people had a portion of their traditional land returned, marking a turning point in their long struggle. The strike is recognized as one of the factors behind the Aboriginal Land Rights Act of 1976, which gave legal recognition to Aboriginal land claims.

As the US population ages, many seniors have turned to so-called brain-training computer games in an attempt to preserve their mental abilities. Some makers of such games claim that playing them benefits users in many ways, from improving memory to preventing conditions that cause cognitive decline, such as Alzheimer's disease. A group of scientists has examined these claims. The scientists did find indications that such brain training helped users to perform better at certain specialized tasks. However, there was little evidence that this had resulted from overall improvements in brain function. Furthermore, the scientists could find no compelling evidence for the claim that playing brain-training games can prevent Alzheimer's disease or lessen its effects.

A further issue with brain-training games is related to the concept of opportunity cost. This is the idea that when people choose to do something, they miss the chance to gain the benefits that would have come from making a different choice. Users who become glued to their smartphones or computers for hours each day playing brain-training games may neglect to spend time reading or exercising, activities for which there is clear evidence of benefits for the aging brain and body.

\bigstar (C) Online Books

Print on demand, or POD, is a publishing method in which books are printed only after customers order them. POD has helped more authors get their books out into the world, as it allows small numbers of books to be printed quickly and cheaply. However, some people say it has also made it easier to produce counterfeit books. They say that works by popular authors are sometimes copied word for word and printed, or texts are altered slightly and released under new titles. The consequences of this illegal activity could potentially be more serious than just lost revenue for the true author. For example, if medical professionals unknowingly purchased counterfeit copies of manuals that contain incorrect information, it could lead to errors in the treatment of patients.

Critics believe some online booksellers are not doing enough to police their stores for counterfeit books. They say the policy of the booksellers is to assume that the books supplied to them have been sent in good faith. The critics believe this is problematic and recommend that online booksellers become more proactive in eliminating counterfeit books. In response, some online booksellers have said they take a zero tolerance approach to counterfeiting and have programs in place to prevent it.

Government funding of research in the US has been cut in recent years, but a new study has shown that this may be a mistake. The study's researchers examined patents, the licenses giving inventors exclusive rights to their inventions. They found that government funding facilitated the creation of a significant percentage of patents issued. Additionally, their analysis indicated that the patents created as a result of government funding contributed the most to the

development of other inventions and were therefore more influential in the creation of future technologies.

According to one economist, one problem with the funding system is that the government frequently shares the risks but rarely gets any of the rewards. If it pumps a massive amount of money into research that comes to nothing, it will be severely criticized, but it is usually not rewarded when the research pays off. The economist believes that the government should continue funding research but, like any investor, should insist on financial returns when a project leads to a successful product. The economist says this would make voters aware of the importance of government funding, and it would also make them more accepting when failures occur.

$\not\simeq$ (E) Parental Leave in Sweden

Today, many countries around the world offer maternity leave to women who give birth. Sweden, however, has offered both parents paid time off since the mid-1970s. Under this parental-leave program, each couple originally received six months of leave, which could be divided between the parents as they saw fit. But while both parents were entitled to use the leave, in the majority of cases, fathers signed their leave over to mothers. To discourage this, the Swedish government has gradually added restrictions. Now, couples get more leave that they can share between them, but each parent has a minimum of 90 days that they cannot transfer to the other parent. The revised system has been successful, and the percentage of the total leave used by fathers has risen significantly.

According to a study by university researchers, the flexibility to take time off that this revised system has afforded Swedish men has also benefited mothers. When fathers took advantage of the system in the period immediately after the birth of a child, it significantly reduced the chances of mothers needing medical care for childbirth-related physical complications. It also decreased the odds that they would need medications to treat anxiety.

Interviewer (I): Thanks for tuning in. Today, we're talking to Shaun Parker. Welcome, Shaun. **Shaun Parker (S):** Thank you for inviting me.

I: So, how did you first become interested in magic?

S: When I was just a young boy, I used to watch a famous comedian who got many of his laughs by deliberately making his magic tricks fail. I loved him, but I decided that I wanted to do magic properly. After that, it became a bit of an addiction.

I: How did that then become a job?

S: Well, it's a bit of a long story, but I used to enter talent competitions in my hometown when I was in high school. At first, I didn't really get very far because I was copying other people rather than trying to develop my own style. But I started showing more of my personality and making more jokes, and I won a national talent competition a year later. From there, I started to do paid shows on weekends. However, I also wanted to get a good education so that if the magic didn't work out full time, I could pursue a different career. My other passion aside from magic is Japanese history, so I went on to study it at university. I came to Japan straight after I graduated and landed a job as a translator. Although that job wasn't great, to be honest, I got to meet a lot of successful businesspeople through work. At a party one time, I did some tricks, and I was then invited to do an official show for one of the biggest companies in Japan. That changed everything for me. It led to similar offers, and within a year, I was making enough just from magic to do it full time. That was over 20 years ago, and I've been working as a professional magician ever since.

I: Are there any challenges to working in Japan?

S: Well, I now read and speak Japanese fluently, so though the language used to be a problem, it isn't now. The main issue I had when I first started was with visas. Not having a regular income or employer meant that it wasn't always easy to convince the government to give me a visa. I had to jump through a lot of bureaucratic hoops most years. Eventually, I realized that the only way I was going to be able to settle was to start my own entertainment company, which solved the problem. Also, this type of work means that I mainly work evenings and weekends, which is sometimes tough these days because I have a family. That's not unique to Japan, but the late nights tend to be a little later here, so that means a lot of my shows are crammed into a short space of time quite late at night.

I: Sounds tough! Who are your main clients now?

S: Nowadays, I mainly perform for corporate clients and occasionally do TV commercials. Until about five years ago, though, I mostly performed at weddings. I used to do up to four weddings every weekend, up and down the country, which was exhausting. As I said, I have a family now, so I have reduced the amount of evening and weekend work I do. Otherwise, I'd never see my

wife and kids.
